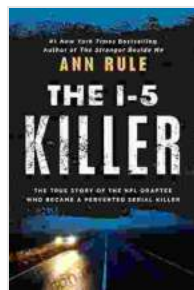


Ann Rule: The Killer Nurse Who Became a Bestselling True Crime Author

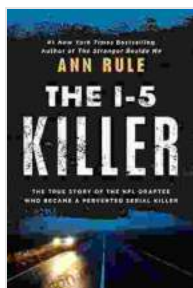
